

Award of S.Hornecker MT(actualized) WCCC Jurmala 2024, Studies

Theme (for Studies and Moremoves): A white piece occupies an X square at least twice during the solution, then leaves it. These occupation moves must be done without capture and without check. The thematic piece may not be a white King.

28 works received from 24 composers. I am honored with the participation of:


Comm – V.Hergert: A short but smart study. The theme realized in seven moves only.

Comm – Y.Afek: An elegant study with his nice circuit by the white Knight. The position remember me the octagon described by another Knight, in a study with similar material published in Sinfonie Scacchistiche 4/2023.

Comm – M. Pasman: It's amazing that with 9 units only, the composer shows two thematic squares. It should have a better position, but the last move of White (leaving the thematic square) is with capture.






Comm – M.Hlinka and L.Kekely: Study without capture. Interesting duel KB+Pawns vs KS+Pawns.

Comm – Jaroslav Polášek: Not very difficult, but a good introduction to the world of endgames.

Comm – P.Arestov and A.Gasparyan: Echo moves are an aesthetic addition to the theme required.

Special Commendation – Jan Timman: A complex study, but unfortunately the square a7 is not thematic, because 1.Qa7 is with check. In first instance, I thought Pawns a5, b5 and b4 were superfluous, but without them White has the dual **10.Ba4** Nd4 **11.Bd7** and mate on g4. I am pretty sure that an economic position is possible.







HM5 – M.Hlinka and L.Kekely: Another fight RB vs RB, but this time the bK is free.


HM4 – Daniele Gatti: The white Bishop makes a circuit to reach the thematic square [e1] twice. An artistic value.







HM3 – Vladislav Tarasiuk: A rather bizarre position, which refers to the Greek letter σ (sigma), from Siegfried or Sarah. But the solution is delightful, with the dance of the Rook in the corners of the board.

HM2 – Beat Neuenschwander: Another dance of Rook g1, this time in a natural position. Two thematic squares: [a1] and [g1]. Good realization from a beginner.


HM1 – Rainer Staudte & Michael Schlosser: The best baby in this Tourney, in my opinion. A solution of great finesse, with many thematic squares.

6th Prize – M.Hlinka and L.Kekely: The first study received in the Tourney enter the Prizes category. In a natural position the solution has two thematic squares. An work which confirm the class of Slovaks.

5th Prize – V.Hergert and M.Minski: A surprising checkmate position, obtained after two blocking moves. An unique thematic move (Rg2!) but the artistic side is impressive.

4th Prize – Yochanan Afek & Michael Pasman: Black has three advanced Pawns, which must be neutralized by White with a precise play. The play finished with a sacrifice of Rook to facilitate the stalemate. A very good work of the Jewish masters.





3rd Prize – Steffen Nielsen: A superb play by the battery QR. White's thematic move Rf6 is with sacrifice and the play finished with another sacrifice by Queen. A high-quality study of the Danish composer.

2nd Prize – Ivan Bondar & Mikhail Khramtsevich: We have here a pregnant thematic content: fourth times **Qa1** and three times **Qh8** (two times without check). The artistic value is also high, because the Queen reached the four corners of the board. An exquisite work!

1st Prize – M. Gromov & O. Pervakov: The authors very elegantly introduced thematic moves using a well-known artistic element: the double staircase. The content of the study is enriched by a fine course: 1.O-O? A tremendous endgame study and maybe a candidate for the study of the Year.

Special HM - Alexey Gasparyan: Knowing about Hornecker's great desire for various kinds of transformations, the Armenian author tried not only to fulfill the theme, but also to somehow connect it with promotions. A monumental work, which I placed second for a while, but later found partially anticipated.

The authors who are present in the Congress, will receive the book **Emilian Dobrescu, selected studies**. I hope the readers have had as much satisfaction following these studies as I have had. In the future, we will give studies the place it deserves in chess Congresses, organizing other thematic tournaments.
